






CREATING PATHWAYS TO SUCCESS

Creating Pathways to Success puts students at the centre of their own learning, viewing them as the architects of their own lives. Students are encouraged to discover who they are, explore opportunities, pursue their passions, and design personal pathways to success.





INDIVIDUAL PATHWAYS PLAN

In the next few years, you'll start thinking about your career. Did you know that the origin of the word career is Latin? It comes from the Latin word "carrus," which was the name for a wheel of a cart. The word career came to mean the path you travel in your life.

This means when you think about your future career, you are thinking about the path you will travel. This means making choices about school, jobs, family, friends, and activities.

WELCOME TO **Xello**

Beginning in grades 6 and 7, our students use a program called Xello which helps students of all backgrounds, abilities, and goals plan for their future. Parents and guardians are encouraged to discuss these plans with the student in their household. If you have any questions about Xello, feel free to ask the school.

Students and parents/guardians can access Xello by logging in at Ihbe.elearningontario.ca/d2l/login and clicking on Xello in the Dashboard.

From the 30 credits required to graduate, two credits must be online learning (eLearning) credits. However, exemption from the eLearning requirement can be requested. Parents may contact the school for the LPS eLearning Student Opt-Out Form.

LITERACY REQUIREMENT

Successful completion of the Ontario Secondary Schools Literacy Test (OSSLT) or the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course (OSSLC)

FINANCIAL LITERACY REQUIREMENT

Starting in September 2025, students must earn a new financial literacy graduation requirement. This will be completed as part of the compulsory Grade 10 mathematics course.

40 COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT HOURS

- Completed over your years in high school.
- Talk to a guidance counsellor for volunteer ideas.
- You can start earning your hours after graduating from Grade 8. This includes the summer before you start classes in Grade 9.

STEM-RELATED COURSE GROUP

Of the 17 compulsory credits, you must complete 1 from the following groups:

- business studies
- computer studies
- cooperative education
- mathematics (in addition to the 3 compulsory credits currently required)
- science (in addition to the 2 compulsory credits currently required)
- technological education (in addition to the 1 compulsory credit required)



What courses do I pick in Grade 9?

GRADE 9 COURSES

In Grade 9, students take eight (8) courses, including Important Notes: five (5) compulsory credits and additional courses to meet Health and Physical Education, Technological Education, and Arts requirements. Students also have the opportunity to choose electives based on their interests.

Compulsory Courses:

- English
- Math
- Science
- Geography of Canada
- French as a Second Language or First Nations, Métis, and Inuit (FNMI) Language: Ojibwe

Additional Required Courses:

- **Technological Education** .
- Health and Physical Education .
- Arts (Drama, Dance, or Music)

Students must earn a credit in Technological Education in either Grade 9 or 10.

French Immersion and IB program students must take Health and Physical Education in Grade 9 to meet program requirements.

It is recommended that students complete their Arts and Health and Physical Education credits in Grade 9. This ensures more flexibility to choose interest-based electives in later grades.

Course Selection Guidance:

Students select nine (9) courses during course selection process, to account for possible scheduling conflicts.

As students move into Grade 10, they will have access to a wider range of courses and pathways. This is an ideal time to align course choices with their future goals, such as college, university, apprenticeship, or workplace pathways.

Questions you may have...

How do I earn a credit?

To earn a credit, you need a final grade of 50% or more in a course.

What happens if I am struggling in a course?

- Talk to your classroom teacher.
- Access tutoring supports that are available through Student Success.
- Take advantage of multiple catch up opportunities.
- Speak with your guidance counsellor.

When can I start to earn my 40 Community Involvement?

You can start to earn your community service hours after graduating from Grade 8. Community service hours must not be scheduled during class time.

How do I choose my courses?

There are many points to consider when choosing courses for your high school program. Because you are unique, it is important to consider the following:

- Your interests, your likes, and your dislikes
- Your learning preferences
- Your strengths and weaknesses
- Your background and experiences
- Your pathway options

Students who select courses consistent with their interests, strengths, and learning style will achieve success in high school.

Where can I go if I have questions about course selection?

Your classroom teacher can help you with choosing courses. You can also call a Lakehead secondary school directly for information. Guidance counsellors are available to answer questions and provide direction. Students and parents/guardians can attend evening information sessions at Lakehead secondary schools. You can talk to parents/guardians of other Lakehead Public School students, as they can be helpful in providing advice in your planning.



TYPES OF COURSES IN GRADE 9 & 10

Types of Courses in Grade 9 & 10

As of September 2022, most Grade 9 courses follow a single de-streamed model, giving all students equal opportunities to explore subjects and discover their interests. This change builds a strong academic foundation and supports various post-secondary pathways. For courses with multiple options, choose the type that best fits your strengths and goals. Some specialized programs, like Special Needs, Pre-Workplace Program (PWP), or Locally Developed Compulsory Courses, are not de-streamed; these courses are generally recommended by school teams, in consultation with parents/guardians. Contact your child's school for details.

Course Types

Destreamed Courses

- Designed for all students, emphasizing essential concepts, real-life applications, and diverse learning experiences.
- Prepares students for all post-secondary pathways: apprenticeship, college, university, or workplace.

Open Courses

- Same expectations for all students, offering general education or skill enrichment.
- Can fulfill compulsory or elective credit requirements.
- Suitable for students pursuing any pathway, depending on the course.

- Focus on theoretical and conceptual learning to prepare for further study in a subject.
- Suitable for students pursuing university, college or apprenticeship pathways.

Applied Courses

- Emphasize essential concepts with practical, hands-on learning.
- Designed for students needing flexibility and additional support.
- Suitable for students pursuing college, apprenticeship, or workplace pathways.

Locally Developed Compulsory Courses

- Focus on essential skills for students needing alternative pathways to meet credit requirements.
- Students generally will take these courses based on discussions between school and parents/guardians.
- To meet requirements for most post-secondary programs, additional courses at higher levels will be necessarily later.

Pre-Advanced Placement (Pre-AP)

- Available at select schools for motivated students aiming for Advanced Placement (AP) in senior grades.
- Covers the Ontario Curriculum with enriched content and skill development, in a faster paced environment.
- Suitable for students aiming to enter post-secondary education with advanced critical thinking and academic skills. Please see page 16 for more information on these courses.

International Baccalaureate Preparatory courses

- Prepares students for the IB Diploma Programme (Grades 11-12).
- Offers enriched, faster-paced learning for high-achieving students.
- Suitable for students pursuing university pathways with a global focus.
- Offered only at Superior Collegiate and Vocational Institute. See page 18 for more information on these courses.


K - Alternative – Non-Credit Courses, Grades 9-12

- Designed for students with developmental or specialized needs.
- Focus on skill-building not covered by credit courses, such as life skills, social skills, or vocational preparation.

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TECHNOLOGY AND RESOURCES



One-To-One Devices



In Grade 9, students receive board-issued laptops. Students are responsible for bringing their laptops to and from school and keeping it charged for classroom use. Our educators integrate technology into teaching methods to support student learning in a global classroom. Responsible and ethical technology use is emphasized, teaching students to become good digital citizens. Rules around digital citizenship, including the appropriate use of social media and addressing cyberbullying, are taught. While personal electronic devices are permitted for academic purposes, students are encouraged to bring their board-provided laptop or their own computing device.

Online and digital resources are incorporated into lessons, which work better on a laptop, rather than a phone or tablet.

WIFI is available in all high schools, and students agree to network and Internet use terms and conditions for its use.

Mathify is a website that offers free math help to students in grades 4 to 12.

Tutors are available Monday to Friday 9:00am to 9:00pm (EST) and Saturday to Sunday 3:00pm to 9:00pm (EST)

Students can access Mathify for free by logging in at www.tvomathify.com



Edsby is the main online learning management system for Hammarskjold HS, Westgate CVI, and Superior CVI. Edsby helps connect students, parents/guardians, and teachers. **Students** can log in to Edsby to stay up to date on class work, grades, and learning resources. **Families** can connect to Edsby so that they can keep up to date on lessons, assessments, school clubs, extra-curricular activities, and school news.

As soon as they start Grade 9, students can connect to Edsby using their school login. Here's how:

- 1. Login: <u>https://lakehead.edsby.com</u> and use your school login. You can also download the app and enter the code lakehead.
- 2. Username: Use the first 8 characters of your first name, followed by the first 8 characters of your last name, and then add two numbers for the month of birth and two numbers for the day of birth(e.g., johndoe1225).
- **3. Password:** Combine the first initials of your first and last name, add a dash, and include the last six numbers of your student ID (e.g., jd-123456).

Parents can also connect with Edsby to stay updated on their child's progress.

- Check your email: Look for an "Invitation from Edsby to connect with your school" in your inbox or spam folder. This invitation will go out once the student in your household has started grade 9. Contact the school if you do not receive this e-mail within the first two weeks of September
- 2. Set up your account: Confirm student information, set a password, and log in at https://lakehead.edsby.com using your email as the username.
- 3. Forgot your password? Parents can click "forgot password" on the main page to reset it.

WE NEED YOUR HELP!

A Grade 9 Verification Form will be sent home with all Grade 8 students in February.

This form includes confidential personal student information.

We need families to focus on the following when filling out the Student Verification Form:

Students and their family are asked to complete all sections of the verification form carefully.

Parent(s)/Guardian(s) and Grade 8 students are asked to consider the courses recommended by the Grade 8 teacher. <u>The completed, signed</u> form is to be returned to the Grade 8 teacher on or before February <u>18th, 2025</u>

Each Grade 8 student has a zoned high school based on the Family of Schools. If a student is NOT going to attend their zoned high school, they must ensure they fill out the form for the school they will attend. This way they can be connected to the correct school in Xello.



February 18, 2025



Parent(s)/Guardian(s) will sign the form before returning it to the school. This signature indicates that the information is correct and has been reviewed, courses have been chosen, and perhaps a transfer has been requested. Once the forms are received by the Grade 8 teacher, transfers will be considered, and all students will select their Grade 9 courses:

February 24 - March 5, 2025

Students will enter selections into the web-based tool XELLO with the support of the Grade 8 Teacher.


FOUR DIRECTIONS

The Four Directions First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Graduation Coach model is an approach that provides holistic supports to Indigenous students and their families. This approach aims to increase academic achievement, student retention, and positive engagement, supporting students through to graduation and beyond to their desired post-secondary pathways.

Four Directions Graduation Coach

All Lakehead Public Schools have a Graduation Coach. The role of the Graduation coach includes:

- Building trust with students, families, staff, and communities;
- Addressing barriers to student success;
- Guiding and supporting individualized pathways based on strengths and interests;
- Maintaining open communication with families;
- Creating inclusive learning spaces for student support and success;
- Offering resources to foster a sense of belonging;
- Advocating for students within the Circle of Caring Adults;
- Facilitating access to tutoring, community supports, course planning, and mentorship;
- Collaborating with school staff, families, and community partners for student success.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM

What is Advanced Placement (AP)

Advanced Placement (AP) is a globally recognized program, available in Grades 11 and 12 at several Lakehead Public Schools. AP courses combine the Ontario curriculum with additional AP content, providing an opportunity for students to challenge themselves with more advanced material. Students in AP can expect a higher workload as they prepare for both the Ontario curriculum and the AP exams. AP courses are designed to help you build skills and knowledge for university while also preparing for the standardized AP exam(s). There are a possible 39 AP exams. AP courses in Lakehead Public Schools generally prepare students for the following exams:

- AP Biology
- AP Chemistry
- AP Calculus AB
- AP Literature and Composition
- AP Language and Composition

The report card and transcript will reflect student achievement in the Ontario curriculum, not the AP content. AP content is evaluated separately through the standardized AP exam (generally taken in May), which may help you earn a postsecondary credit, based on the score and the university the student attends.

What is Pre AP?

Pre-AP courses are based entirely on the Ontario curriculum and are designed to prepare students for success in AP courses. While Pre-AP is not required to take AP later, it helps students build key skills and habits to handle the increased expectations of AP.

In Pre-AP, students can expect a more demanding workload, focusing on skills like:

- Inquiry and problem-solving
- Critical thinking and creativity
- Communication and collaboration

These courses help students develop confidence and independence as a learner.

Grade 9 Pre-Advanced Placement courses are offered at select schools, based on availability.

FRENCH IMMERSION

Hammarskjold High School offers a French Immersion Diploma to students wishing to continue their study of the French language. To obtain the Diploma, students are required to take ten credits with French as the language of instruction. Four of these credits must be French Immersion language credits. French Immersion compulsory courses en français include:

- Geography of Canada Grade 9
- Healthy Active Living Education Grade 9
- Civics Grade 10
- Career Studies Grade 10
- Canadian History since WWI Grade 10

For the other French credits, students choose additional courses from the following:

- Food and Nutrition HFN2OF
- Cooperative Education DCO3OF
- Healthy Active Living Education PPL2OF
- Food and Culture HFC3MF
- Introduction to Anthropology, Sociology, and Psychology HSP3UF

The variety of course offerings and full immersion experience provide students with ample opportunities to enhance and refine their oral and written French language skills through structured and unstructured daily interaction. In addition, students will expand their knowledge of the language through the study of francophone culture and literature.

By the end of the four year program, students will participate easily in conversations and discussions, will be able to take courses at the college or university level in which French is the language of instruction, and will be able to accept employment in which French is the working language.

Hammarskjold is proud to be a partner in the Centre DELF-DALF du Nord Ouest Ontario (Accredited Testing Centre) providing the opportunity for our Grade 12 students, upon successful completion of the DELF scolaire test, to obtain an internationally-recognized DELF certificate.

Exchange programs through ISE Ontario are available to further enhance language proficiency skills.

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMME

Superior Collegiate and Vocational Institute

Superior CVI is proud to offer the International Baccalaureate Programme, consisting of two years of SCVI IB Preparatory courses in Grades 9 and 10, followed by the Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. The IB Programme, a symbol of academic integrity in over 145 countries, is designed for students who are looking for a challenge as they enter high school, and are seeking classmates who have similar interests and attitudes towards school. The IB student is enthusiastic about learning and is eager to participate in a wide variety of school and community events. The first two years of the IB Programme help to prepare students for entry into the Diploma Programme, and provide students with an enriched and accelerated course of study which goes beyond The Ontario Curriculum.

The IB Diploma, designed to meet the highest standards required by any university in the world, is governed by the International Baccalaureate Head Office in Geneva, Switzerland. Students who complete the Diploma requirements place themselves at an advantage as they enter university, as the advanced nature of the IB curriculum exposes students to a significant amount of first-year university content.
